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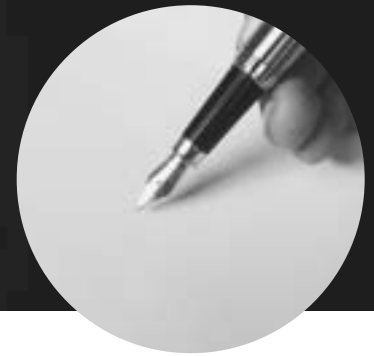

A Lighter and it's Infamous San Antonio Connection

I love lighters that are personalized! Monograms, names, dates and salutations carved into a piece brings it alive and freezes it in a moment of time- this belonged to someone that thought enough of it to permanently mark it as theirs.

I recently acquired a lighter engraved with some San Antonio historical relevance- here's the story.

I was in a local jeweler's shop with my wife. We know the family that owns it, and she had a watch in need of repair. I had brought along a lift arm lighter that needed a small hole tapped, hoping that a jeweler could do it for me. While he was not able to fix the lift arm (his tools were all designed for softer metals) we got to talking about the fact that I collect old lighters. His wife piped up and mentioned that they had a very special lighter.

The jeweler's father ran a shop back in the day, and a regular customer had them order a Dunhill Foot Rule lighter. It was engraved IKE WEST JR. FROM SOL WEST. My wife immediately recognized the family names, as they were a wealthy and highly visible clan locally. We were told that the lighter was never picked up by the buyer, so they held onto it through the years.

Sol and Ike Jr. were brothers. Their parents and uncles had made their fortune first in the cattle business, then in oil (the Texas version of the American Dream). Ike and his wife Sandra moved to Beverly Hills, where they lived the high life. By all accounts, Sandra loved the limelight and trappings that wealth afforded her.

Ike died under mysterious circumstances in a Las Vegas Flamingo Hotel room in 1968, at the age of 33. Sandra most likely died of an overdose of prescription medication in 1977, at the age of 38.

Here's where the story gets interesting! In Sandra's will, she stipulated that she be buried in her white lace nightgown, reclining in the front seat of her 1964 Ferrari. The will was contested, but after a protracted legal battle, her wishes were ultimately carried out. On May 18, 1977 the funeral made national news. Sandra had been dressed in her favorite negligee, put in the front seat of her Ferrari and enclosed in a box measuring 10 feet x 19 feet x 9 feet. The box was lowered into a huge hole next to Ike's grave at San Antonio's Alamo Masonic Cemetery, then covered with cement to discourage looters. The grave is marked with a nondescript tombstone, with only her name and the dates of her birth and death.

A quick online search of her name returns multiple articles and videos about her life and unusual burial.

I am now the proud owner of this piece of San Antonio history!

In early 2020, I had some free time because work travel was suspended, and pretty much all extracurricular family activities had come to a halt. I had sold some vintage bike parts for my dad on eBay and did well. He mentioned that if I ever wanted to try to sell his old lighters, I was welcome to dig the boxes out from the storage space under the steps in their house and have at it. As a few months passed and normal activities didn't resume, I went to their house and looked for the boxes—assuming there were a couple.

What I found was truly amazing. My dad had 11 large boxes packed with lighters, all wrapped in newspaper (1999 Cleveland Plain Dealers and Wall Street Journals, to be exact). I covered our guest bed in a tarp and set up two folding tables and started unpacking them. When the last box was empty, I stood back and stared at more than 600 lighters, about 400 pocket lighters and 200 table lighters.

This is where the story begins, really. I started researching them and quickly found Facebook groups dedicated to a few of the more popular types (Zippo, Ronson, Dunhill, IMCO) and OTLS.



Here are some of my dad's pocket lighters. His collection included lighters from around the world from the early-1900s through the 1980s.



My dad's table lighter collection was large and ranged from Ronson Touch Tips and Dunhills to more common Japanese styles.

I immediately recognized OTLS because in one of the boxes of lighters was a stack of printed newsletters (OTLS and PLPG) from the 1980s and early-90s. Through these groups, I began connecting with collectors to learn enough not to be take advantage of while selling. I sold about 100 to private collectors and resellers and then listed the rest on eBay one at a time at .99 cent no reserve starting bids. I researched each one so I could provide the most thorough item descriptions. This process took months but eventually all the lighters were sold, and my dad was VERY happy with how much they brought.

For me, I had gained a tremendous amount of knowledge about an extremely diverse range of lighters and had a solid grasp on values in the current market. I was by no means an expert, but I knew enough to begin buying and selling as a hobby. That's where I am now, a buyer, seller and collector of vintage lighters; completely immersed in the world of tobacciana and building my own collection that now exceeds 300—focused on Ronson petrol lighters, WW2 service models, Zippos engraved with my name and with greenhouse or nursery advertising and rope/wick lighters. I chat with folks about lighters every day, obsess over finding the correct boxes and geek out over vintage display pieces. I've made great friends and figured out to resell enough to fund my collecting.

Lastly ... Why Ronson, you may ask? While unpacking the boxes of my dad's lighters, I found four that are very special to me. My grandpa and grandma's Ronsons (Adonis and Princess, respectively) and my uncle's Pioneer. I also have a butane side roller with a digital watch face that my mom bought for my dad and had engraved with his initials.

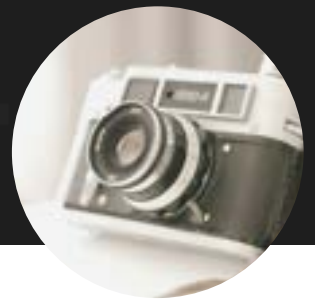
Thanks for the opportunity to share my lighter story and I appreciate all the collectors in this wonderful community! Feel free to reach out any time—I love to talk lighters.

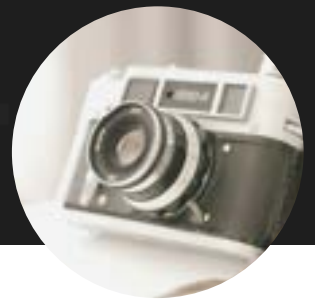

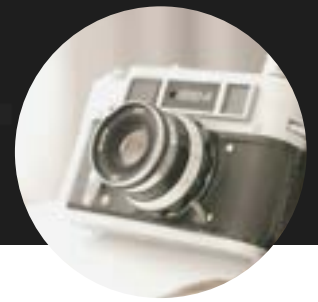

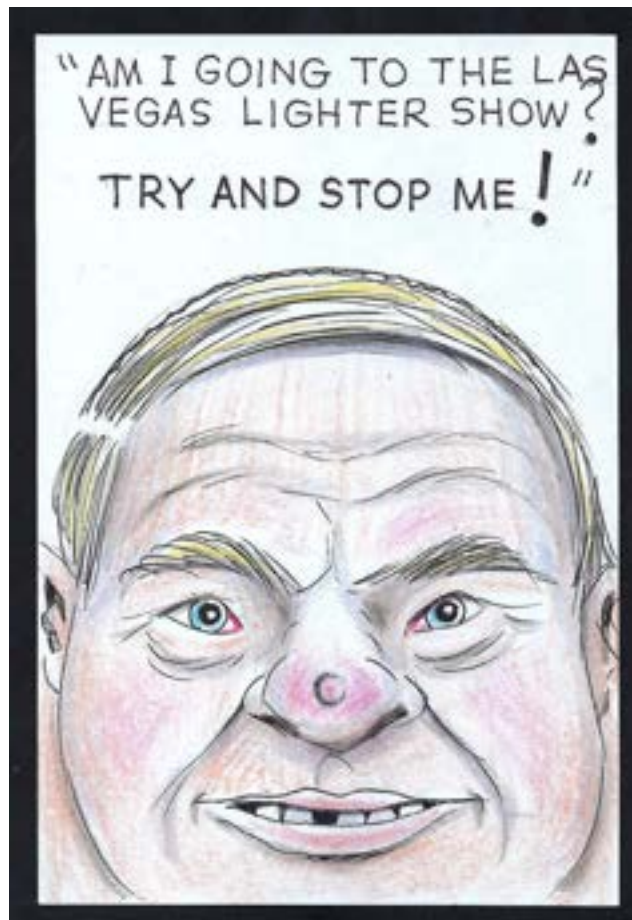
