

As well as being pleased with meeting Gene, I was <u>really</u> excited when he showed up with 2 <u>HUGE</u> boxes and 2 sacks of lighters to "show and tell". We spent a wonderful afternoon looking at lighters, with Gene telling me stories of where he bought many of them.

Gene has many unusual lighters, but to tell about all the ones we looked at would take pages. But on to a few....I was almost in tears (from envy) when I saw Gene's "Cable Car" - - a gold colored metal, looks like a San Francisco Cable Car, about 7" long. This was the first one I had seen! 4th Ed. - 1984 Price Guide.


Most of these books can be located in your public library, and if you can't check them out, they will usually xerox the pages for you.


