IN THE SPOTLIGHT....

FROM OUR PARIS CORRESPONDENT!

Carlo Valerio is now in Paris, France and has written to tell us about his collection.

One point Carlo forgot to mention in his letter is whether he and his wife, Helena, have moved permanently to Paris, or just there on assignment? How about it, Carlo?

Carlo had been collecting Art Deco objects and fell in love the with Ronson "Bartender" - - and there began another lighter collection.

Carlo went to to say he collects a lot of table lighters, from the oldest to the first butane lighter. Although at present he not only has about 500 table lighters, he also has about 800 pocket lighters and close to 60 case lighters.

He went on to describe a few of his favorites from his collection. One of his oldest is a Tinder Pistol from the late 1700's. Among the more unusual ones, he has a Faberge gold and mother of pearl table lighter and a silver Dunhill table lighter with watch. But Carlo considers that his most unusual is a gold painted table lighter in the shape of a 'Cocker Springer Dog' with a striker hidden inside the head.

Recalling some of his experiences with buying lighters, Carlo said one of the funniest experiences he has had was when he found a 'Dunhill Lady Compact Case Lighter' - - which he discovered was not a lighter, but a fake lighter and a real compact!

Carlo's wife and friends help him find new additions to his lighter collection, as well as his collections of radios, safety razors and early plastics. He expressed the hope that OTLS will help add to his lighter collection. At present he is looking for the 'Champanze' and 'Bulldog' Ronson strikers. Also would like to buy any other Ronson touch tip or strikers and Deco lighters. So if any of you have any you want to sell, please let Carlo know.

It is always interesting to hear how another lighter collector displays lighters. Carlo told me he only displays the table lighters, and displays them by group of interest.


Following are excerpts from an article contributed by Al Grosskopf on the Alfred Dunhill of London, Limited company.

Alfred Dunhill Limited was formed in London on July 2, 1923, as part of the formation of two independent companies. Herbert Dunhill became Managing Director. And for the next five years, until his retirement in 1928, Alfred Dunhill remained Chairman of the Company.

The Dunhill Lighter appeared in 1924. As a sequel to the various crude and unreliable lighters that had appeared during and after the war, the Dunhill Lighter had spent a long time under test, and its reliability depended upon simplicity of its design and the care with which it had been made. The horizontal flint wheel that could be operated by one hand was the essence of its patent. It is the action of the prototype which is used in numerous shapes, sizes and styles of Dunhill Lighters to this day.

Later lighters in silver and gold were followed by designs in enamel and lacquer. The idea of watch and lighter a combined led to other articles, as powder compacts cigarette cases, until it was obvious there was no end to ingenuity of the craftsman. Many jewelled lighters were made for special orders, and of these one representing a basket of flowers and costing what was a princely sum at that time, was the most elaborate lighter that has ever been made. Soon there lighters for every occasion lighters for the pocket, the table and novelty lighters ranging from those with hand-painted pictures to the well known representation of an 18th century tinder pistol and the graceful replica of Roman lamp.

A 1932 catalogue shows the Dunhill "Watch" Lighters ranged in price from \$60.00 to \$250.00 for a "14 Carat Gold, Engine-Turned, 'Standard' Size".
